

# Religious switching and mental disorders in young adulthood: evidence from Finnish population register data

## **Background and aim**

- Few studies on religious switching and mental health of young adults
- Young adulthood: movement away from religion and mental health problems are common
- First study to analyse interrelation between religious switching and sickness absence due to mental disorders
- Population register data with detailed ICD codes





- Follow-up study on entire population born in Finland in 1984–1996 (N=794,476)
- Each person observed from age 20 in 2004–2018
- Cox proportional hazards, w/o and with controls, w/o and with sibling-fixed effects
- Association between religious switching and first-time sickness allowance receipt from mental disorders (F chapter)
- Presented as hazard ratios for mental health related SA receipt

## Results



#### Total population, with control variables

### Conclusion



- Religious switching matters (over time), direction matters
- Particularly from Lutheran and from Other religion
- Being and becoming non-affiliated related to poor mental health
- Not simply because families differ
- Who becomes unaffiliated?
- Other contexts than Finland
